Chestermere Public Library's New Children's Play Space



In order to support an aging library space and to support play as an essential activity contributing to the health and success of the community's children, the City of Chestermere Library Board made a significant investment in the construction of pirate-themed play space. The play space includes integrated learning games, play equipment, and a digital play screen. The Library Board hired Keebee Play to design and install the new space. The project took over a year from conception to full implementation, with a kickoff on Canada Day 2022. The design included a 'nested' and enclosed space for babies, a pirate

ship, wall panels, and flooring that resembles water and sand to complete the experience. The materials utilized in the space are durable and can be easily cleaned and sanitized. Characters in the space represent the diversity in the community. Additionally, the library was able to engage Qualico Communities to be a featured and partial sponsor.

Why play at the library? Play is considered fundamental in public libraries, and many different types of strategies have been implemented to encourage play. Successful libraries such as Calgary Public Library (with their many Early Learning Centres featuring play items and play infrastructure) have integrated play into their spaces. Play is also a key practice outlined by the Public Library Association's (of the American Library Association) Every Child Ready to Read at your Library curriculum (5 Key curriculum practices- sing, talk, read, write, play-as a parental "practices" to encourage child development). Adding play to public library spaces provides adults and children the opportunity to learn and create relationships through play, in a safe and inclusive environment. According to the United Nations, play is considered a basic right of children (Article 31).

Since the kickoff of the new space this summer, library door count has increased considerably. One parent told staff that she can't tell her child that they are coming to the library until right beforehand because the child is so excited to be coming to the library now, that he will not sleep the night before. Staff observe families spending many hours in the space reading and playing and many more community members use the

The best outcome for us has been the positive "buzz" it has created in the community. The community is talking about the library- this has been the best possible return on investment for the project (besides the smiles and laughter of the children)!

We meet twice a year in the spring and autumn, most recently by Zoom of course, but we are hoping by spring of 2023, it will be an in-person event at the beautiful new Marigold Headquarters. The meetings are a supportive environment to share concerns, ask questions and share your own wonderful programming ideas.

Statistics Canada tells us that 69.9% of Indigenous people live off of reserves, mostly in urban settings but with 17.4% in rural areas. Even if your library is not situated near a reserve, there are many potential Indigenous library patrons within your community.

Any librarian interested would be most welcome to join us, you do not have to be an expert in Indigenous outreach. You may have an interest in supporting your own library patrons on matters surrounding Truth and Reconcialtion, collection development, programming ideas and hosting cultural events are also all fun ways to increase your library's profile in your community.
